GOTV in Arkansas

First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Arkansas
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Arkansas is October 7.





Voter Identification

In Arkansas, photo IDs are required to register and cast a ballot.

- If you're registered to vote but your name doesn't appear on the registration list, or if you don't have a valid ID, you can cast a provisional ballot. If you move to a new address in your county but outside your precinct, you have the right to vote at your new precinct.

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Arkansas does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions





Voting While Living With a Disability

- The Arkansas Secretary of State does not (currently) provide guidance online for people with disabilities; however, federal law requires poling places to have specific accommodations available.
- Arkansas voters can vote by mail if they are unable to go to the polls due to physical disability.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Arkansas requires an excuse for absentee voting. Valid excuses include:
 - You will be unavoidably absent from your polling site on Election Day
 - You will be unable to attend your polling site on Election Day due to illness or physical disability
 - You are a member of the Uniformed Services and are away from your polling location
- Your absentee ballot cannot be hand delivered on Election Day.



Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 29 if they're requesting online or by mail; the deadline is November 1 for those requesting in person.
- In Arkansas, an absentee ballot must be received by November 1 if dropping it off in person; the deadline is 7:30pm on November 5 for those returning their ballot by mail.

PFLAG recommends that voters request their absentee ballots as soon as possible and get them in the mailbox no later than Tuesday, October 22.

Early voting

Vote early.

- All registered voters in Arkansas can vote early for any reason.

- Early voting begins on October 21 and ends on November 4.
- Voters who plan to vote early are required to have identification. Learn more here: <u>sos.arkansas.gov/elections/voter-information/voter-registration-information/voting-in-arkansas</u>





Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Arkansas at 7:30am and close at 7:30pm on Tuesday, November 5.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:

- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
