## First things first

#### Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
  - Check your registration status
  - If you are not registered REGISTER NOW.
  - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Washington, D.C.
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Washington, D.C. is **October 25** (online or by mail).





## You can register to vote in-person during early voting and on Election Day in Washington, D.C.

### Voter Identification

In DC, identification is required for some first-time voters to cast a ballot.

- If you're a first-time voter who registered by mail or online and did not provide identification, you're required to provide the following documents with your ballot:
  - A copy of a valid government-issued photo ID; OR
  - A copy of a current utility bill, government check, paycheck, or other government-issued document that shows your name and address.

## **Voting While Trans/Nonbinary**

Washington, D.C. does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions





## Voting While Living With a Disability

- If you are unable to enter a voting center due to a disability, seniority, or illness, you can vote curbside from your car. Curbside voting is available at all voting centers.
- The Accessible Remote Ballot (ARB) Marking System will be available for voters with disabilities to vote independently and privately. - If you're unable to stand in line due to your disability, alert an Election Worker. They may move you to the front of the line or provide a chair.

# All eligible voters registered before October 31 will be automatically mailed a ballot with prepaid postage.

## Absentee voting or voting by mail

#### Vote by mail.

- Voters only need to request a ballot if they're going to be away from their DC residence during the election. The request must be received by October 31. You can request a ballot here: <a href="https://www.vr.dcboe.org/213115759199060"><u>vr.dcboe.org/213115759199060</u></a>
- In DC, an absentee ballot must be postmarked before or on November 5 and must be received no later than November 15.
- Your absentee ballot can be hand delivered to a voting center, drop box, or local election official on election day. PFLAG recommends that voters request their absentee ballots as soon as possible and get them in the mailbox no later than Tuesday, October 22.

## **Early voting**

#### Vote early.

- All registered voters in Washington, D.C. can vote early for any reason.
- You can find information about early voting locations in Washington, D.C. here: vote411.org/pflag.
- Early voting begins in Washington, D.C. on October 28 and ends on November 3.





### **Voting on Election Day:**

#### Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Washington, D.C. at 7am and close at 8pm on Tuesday, November 5.
- Voters may cast their ballot at any vote center, regardless of their residential address.
  You can find vote center locations here: vote411.org/pflag
- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
  - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
  - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.





# If you are in line to vote when the polls close, STAY IN LINE.
