## First things first

#### Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
  - Check your registration status
  - If you are not registered REGISTER NOW.
  - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Hawaii
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Hawaii is October 28.





### Voter Identification

In Hawai'i, photo IDs are not required to register and cast a ballot.

- If you're registering to vote for the first time and do not have a Hawaii Driver License, Hawai'i State ID, or the last 4-digits of your Social Security Number, you must provide proof of identification.

## **Voting While Trans/Nonbinary**

The state of Hawaii does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions





## Voting While Living With a Disability

- You can vote at home with an accessible electronic ballot and return the voted ballot electronically or by using the return ballot envelope.
- You can vote at a voter service center using a ballot marking device. The device includes a large touchscreen interface, tactile buttons, audio, adjustable text size and contrast, and it is compatible with external tactile switches and "sip and puff" devices.
- Curbside voting is available at all voter service centers.
- All voter centers must be accessible, and you can have anyone except your employer or union representative assist you with completing your ballot.

# All registered voters automatically receive a mail ballot approximately eighteen days prior to the election (October 18).

## Absentee voting or voting by mail

#### Vote by mail.

- Registered voters automatically receive a mail ballot. You only need to request a ballot if you'll be away from your Hawaii residence during the election.

- In Hawai'i an absentee ballot must be received by 7pm on November 5.
- Your absentee ballot can be returned in person at a voter service center or drop box. You can find locations here: <u>elections.hawaii.gov/voter-</u> <u>service-centers-and-places-of-deposit/</u>





## PFLAG recommends that voters get their ballots in the mailbox no later than Tuesday, October 22.

## **Early voting**

#### Vote early.

- All registered voters in Hawaii can vote early for any reason.
- Early voting begins in Hawaii on October 22 and ends on November 4.

### **Voting on Election Day:**

#### Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Hawaii at 7am and close at 7pm on Tuesday, November 5.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:
  vote411.org/pflag
- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
  - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
  - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.





## If you are in line to vote when the polls close, STAY IN LINE.
