## GOTW in Idaho

## First things first

#### Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
  - Check your registration status
  - If you are not registered REGISTER NOW.
  - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Idaho
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Idaho is October 11.





## You can register to vote on election day at your polling place.

### Voter Identification

In Idaho, photo ID and proof of residence are required to register to vote. Photo ID is requested while checking in to vote but is not required.

- If you do NOT have photo ID, you can complete a signed affidavit attesting to your identity.



## **Voting While Trans/Nonbinary**

The state of Idaho does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions





## Voting While Living With a Disability

- All voting locations will provide voting equipment that offers audio, adjustable font sizes, adjustable contracts, and adaptations for marking the ballot.
- Idaho law allows for curbside voting; however, no information is provided on Idaho's voting website confirming that it'll be available.
- You can bring someone with you to assist in the voting process or request help from an election worker.

## Absentee voting or voting by mail

#### Vote by mail.

- Idaho does not require an excuse for absentee voting.
- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 25 online or November 1 in person.
- In Idaho, an absentee ballot must be received by 8pm on November 5.
- You can request an absentee ballot here: <u>elections.sos.idaho.gov/ElectionLink</u>
- Your absentee ballot cannot be hand delivered to a polling place on election day. You must return it by mail or at a secure ballot drop box.





PFLAG recommends that voters request their absentee ballots as soon as possible and get them in the mailbox no later than Tuesday, October 22.

## **Early voting**

#### Vote early.

- Some counties offer early voting. Any registered voter in that county may vote early. Check with your county elections office for early voting availability, dates, and times: <u>voteidaho.gov/county-clerk/</u>

## **Voting on Election Day:**

#### Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Idaho at 8am and close at 8pm on Tuesday, November 5.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:

- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
  - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
  - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA





# If you are in line to vote when the polls close, STAY IN LINE.
