

First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Missouri
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Missouri is **October 9.**





Voter Identification

In Missouri, photo IDs are required to cast a ballot.

- All photo IDs must be nonexpired, unless it is a driver's or non-driver license that expired after the last general election.
- If you do not have an acceptable form of ID, you can cast a provisional ballot.

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Missouri does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions

Voting While Living With a Disability

- Voters with limited mobility can vote curbside.
- All voting locations should be in compliance with the ADA and HAVA.
- If you have a permanent physical disability you may request to be placed on a designated list so that you automatically receive a mail in ballot.
- If your polling place is not accessible, you may request a different polling place assignment by calling 800-NOW-VOTE.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Missouri requires an excuse for absentee voting. Valid excuses include:
 - Absence on election day from the election authority in which you're registered to vote
 - Incapacity due to illness or physical disability on election day
 - Caring for someone with an illness or physical disability on election day
 - Religious belief or practice
 - Certified participation in the address confidentiality program established under sections 589.660 to 589.681





Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 23 if requested by mail or November 4 if requested in person.
- In Missouri, an absentee ballot must be received by 7pm on November 5.

- Your absentee ballot cannot be hand delivered to your polling place on election day. You can return the ballot by mail or at a local election office.



You must complete your absentee ballot in front of a notary and provide photo ID unless you are overseas, active-duty military, or are permanently disabled.

PFLAG recommends that voters request their absentee ballots as soon as possible and get them in the mailbox no later than Tuesday, October 22.

Getting Out The Vote

Early voting

Vote early.

- All registered voters in Missouri can vote early for any reason.
- Early voting begins in Missouri on October 22 and ends on November 4.

Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Missouri at 6am and close at 7pm on Tuesday, November 5.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here: vote411.org/pflag
- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.





If you are in line to vote when the polls close, STAY IN LINE.
