## GOTV in New Hampshire

## First things first

#### Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
  - Check your registration status
  - If you are not registered REGISTER NOW.
  - Find information about who is eligible to vote in New Hampshire
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in New Hampshire depends on the locality; however, same day registration is available on November 5.





## You can register to vote in-person, at your polling place on election day.

## Voter Identification

In New Hampshire, photo IDs are required to register and cast a ballot.

- If you do not have an approved photo ID, you can obtain a free photo ID by presenting a voucher from your town clerk, or the Secretary of State, to any NH DMV.

## **Voting While Trans/Nonbinary**

The state of New Hampshire does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions





## Voting While Living With a Disability

- Curbside voting is available for voters who are unable to enter the polling place. You can only
  vote in this manner if an unforeseen accessibility issue arises.
- Each polling place has an accessible voting system called "one4all." More details can be found here: <a href="mailto:sos.nh.gov/elections/learn-about-voting-disabilities">sos.nh.gov/elections/learn-about-voting-disabilities</a>
- You can receive assistance from an election worker or a support person of your choice. The person cannot be your employer or a representative of your union.
- Voters with print disabilities can receive an electronic ballot.
- Voters with disabilities qualify to vote in any New Hampshire election by absentee ballot. More information here: <a href="mailto:sos.nh.gov/elections/absentee-ballots">sos.nh.gov/elections/absentee-ballots</a>



## Absentee voting or voting by mail

### Vote by mail.

- New Hampshire requires an excuse for absentee voting. Valid excuses include:
  - An absence from town on election day
  - A religious observance that prevents you from voting in person
  - A physical disability or illness that prevents you from voting in person
  - An employment or childcare commitment during the entire time the polls are op
  - And more: <u>sos.nh.gov/elections/absentee-ballots</u>



## Absentee voting or voting by mail

### Vote by mail.

- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 29, if requested by mail. Voters can request a ballot in person until 3pm on November 4.
- In New Hampshire, an absentee ballot must be received by 5pm on November 5, if returning by mail. It must be received by 5pm on November 4 if returning in person.
- You can request an absentee ballot from your local clerk: <a href="mailto:app.sos.nh.gov/">app.sos.nh.gov/</a>
- Your absentee ballot cannot be hand delivered on election day.





PFLAG recommends that voters request their absentee ballots as soon as possible and get them in the mailbox no later than Tuesday, October 22.

## New Hampshire does not offer in person early voting.

## **Voting on Election Day:**

### Vote on election day.

- Polls open in New Hampshire between 6am and 11am and close at 7pm on Tuesday,
   November 5.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:

- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
  - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
  - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
