First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in North Carolina
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in North Carolina is October 11.





Voter Identification

In North Carolina, photo IDs are required to cast a ballot.

- If you do not have an acceptable photo ID, you can vote a provisional ballot and return to your county board of elections office with an acceptable photo ID before November 14.

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of North Carolina does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions





Voting While Living With a Disability

- If you have a print disability, you can request, mark, and return an accessible ballot online through the NC Absentee Ballot Portal: <u>votebymail.ncsbe.gov/app/home</u>
- Curbside voting is available if you are unable to enter the polling place without physical
 assistance due to age or disability. COVID-19 symptoms and/or being
 immunocompromised qualifies as a disability.
- All polling places with have an accessible voting machine and the parking lot and interior
 of the polling place will be accessible to voters in wheelchairs.

Getting Out The Vote

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- North Carolina does not require an excuse for absentee voting.
- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 29.
- In North Carolina, an absentee ballot must be received by 7:30pm on November 5.
- You can request an absentee ballot here: votebymail.ncsbe.gov/app/home.
- Your absentee ballot cannot be hand delivered to a polling place on election day. You must return it via mail, in person at your county elections office, or at an early voting site in your county.





PFLAG recommends that voters request their absentee ballots as soon as possible and get them in the mailbox no later than Tuesday, October 22.

Getting Out The Vote

Early Voting

Vote early.

- All registered voters in North Carolina can vote early for any reason.
- You can find information about early voting locations in North Carolina here:

- Early voting begins in North Carolina on October 17 and ends on November 2.
- Same-day registration is available at all early voting sites. Same-day registration is not available on Election Day.
- Voters who plan to vote early in North Carolina are required to have identification. Learn more here: ncsbe.gov/voting/voter-id#onsite



Getting Out The Vote

Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in North Carolina at 6:30am and close at 7:30pm on Tuesday, November 5.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:
 vote411.org/pflag
- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.





If you are in line to vote when the polls close, STAY IN LINE.
