# First things first

## Register to vote:

- Go to: [vote411.org/pflag](https://vote411.org/pflag)
  - Check your registration status
  - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
  - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Oklahoma
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Oklahoma is **October 11**.



# Voter Identification

In Oklahoma, photo IDs are required to cast a ballot.

- If you do not have or refuse to show proof of identity, you may vote a provisional ballot and sign a sworn affidavit. 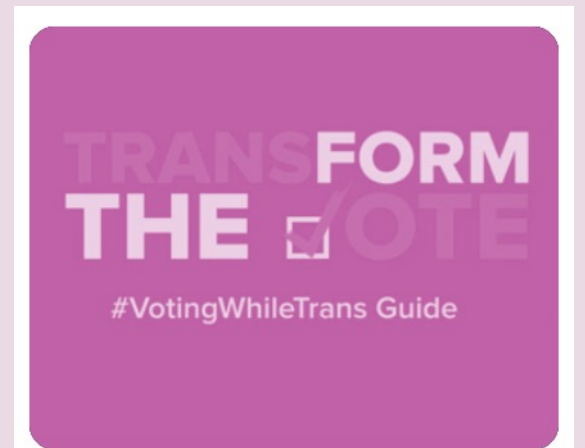

# Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Oklahoma does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions

# Voting While Living With a Disability

- All polling places are physically accessible.
- Every polling place will be equipped with a Hart InterCivic eScan A/T voting device which has an audio tactile interface. It is compatible with sip and puff devices and tactile input switches.
- Voters who are blind may apply for an accessible absentee ballot be delivered electronically; however, the ballot must be returned by mail or in person to the county election board.
- Voters with disabilities do not have to have their absentee ballot notarized, but they must have two witnesses sign their ballot.
- Curbside voting is available for voters who are physically unable to enter their polling place.

# Absentee voting or voting by mail

## Vote by mail.

- Oklahoma does **not** require an excuse for absentee voting.
- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 21.
- In Oklahoma, an absentee ballot must be received by November 4 if dropping off in person. The ballot must be received by November 5 if returning by mail.
- There are several different types of absentee ballots in Oklahoma. Each type has its own specific instructions for requesting, completing, and returning the ballot. **Oklahoma requires proof of identity  
and a notarized signature on all  
"standard" absentee ballots.  
Notaries may not charge a fee to  
notarize an absentee ballot affidavit.**

**PFLAG recommends that voters request their absentee ballots as soon as possible and get them in the mailbox no later than Tuesday, October 22.**

# Early Voting

**Vote early.**

- All registered voters in Oklahoma can vote early for any reason.

- Early voting begins in Oklahoma on October 30 and ends on November 2 at 2pm.
- Voters who plan to vote early in Oklahoma are required to have identification.



# Voting on Election Day:

### **Vote on election day.**

- Polls open in Oklahoma at 7am and close at 7pm on Tuesday, November 5.

- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
  - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
  - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.

STAY IN LINE.**
