First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Tennessee
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Tennessee is October 7.





Voter Identification

In Tennessee, photo IDs are required to cast a ballot.

- If you don't bring a photo ID, you can vote a provisional ballot. You must return by November 7 to have your vote counted.
- If you cannot obtain a free photo ID, you can sign an affidavit stating as much. You will then be able to cast a regular ballot.



Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Tennessee does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions





Voting While Living With a Disability

- The Tennessee Secretary of State does not (currently) provide guidance online for people with disabilities; however, federal law requires poling places to have specific accommodations available.
- All polling places must be accessible and have at least one accessible voting machine.
- Curbside voting is not available.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Tennessee requires an excuse for absentee voting. Valid excuses include:
 - 60 years of age or older
 - You're hospitalized, ill, or physically disabled. (Or you're a caretaker)
 - You'll be out of your county during the early voting period and all day on November 5.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 29.
- You can download an absentee ballot application on the Tennessee Secretary of State's website.
- In Tennessee, an absentee ballot must be received by November 5.
- Your absentee ballot cannot be hand delivered on election day.
 You must return it via mail.





PFLAG recommends that voters request their absentee ballots as soon as possible and get them in the mailbox no later than Tuesday, October 22.

Early Voting

Vote early.

- All registered voters in Tennessee can vote early for any reason.
- You can find information about early voting locations in Tennessee here: vote411.org/pflag
- Early voting begins in Tennessee on October 16 and ends on October 31.
- Voters who plan to vote early in Tennessee are required to have identification.

Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Tennessee on Tuesday, November 5 at different times depending on your county and close at 7 pm CT/ 8 pm ET.
- ou can find information about the location of your polling place here:

- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.





If you are in line to vote when the polls close, STAY IN LINE.
