First things first

Register to vote.

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in the Virgin Islands
- The voter registration deadline in the U.S. Virgin Islands is **October 6**.



Voter Identification

In the U.S. Virgin Islands, identification is required when registering to vote and requested when casting a ballot.

- If a voter does not have proper identification, they can complete an affidavit of affirmation that they are the person listed on the Poll List before being permitted to vote.

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The U.S. Virgin Islands do not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions



TRANSform the Vote

Voting While Living With a Disability

- Voters can have one person of their choosing assist them in the voting booth. That person cannot be the voter's employer or union representative.
- Each polling place will have at least one voting machine that is accessible for voters with disabilities.
- If you experience discrimination at the polls, you can file an administrative complaint. Those procedures can be found here: vivote.gov/voters/voters-rights-responsibilities/

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- The U.S. Virgin Islands do not require an excuse for absentee voting.
- Most voters must request their absentee ballot by October 14. Military voters can request their ballots up to November 5.
- In the Virgin Islands, an absentee ballot must be postmarked by November 5 and received by November 15.

PFLAG recommends that voters request their absentee ballots as soon as possible and get them in the mailbox no later than Tuesday, October 22.

Early Voting

Vote early.

- All registered voters in the U.S. Virgin Islands can vote early for any reason.
- Early voting locations can be found here: vote411.org/pflag
- Early voting begins on St. Croix and St. Thomas on October 14 and ends on October 28.
- Early voting begins on St. John on October 21 and ends on October 28.
- Some first-time voters who plan to vote early are required to provide ID. Learn more here: vivote.gov/voters/voters-rights-responsibilities/




Getting Out The Vote

Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in the Virgin Islands at 7am and close at 7pm on Tuesday, November 5.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:
vote411.org/pflag
- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
