First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Alaska.
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Alaska is October 4.



Voter Identification

In Alaska, photo IDs are required to register and cast a ballot.

- If you do not have an acceptable form of photo ID you can vote.
 - You will need to provide a current utility bill, paycheck, government check or bank statement, or other government issued document with your current residential address.

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Alaska does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions

Voting While Living With a Disability

- If you are a voter with special needs, you can have a personal representative pick up and deliver a ballot to you if you are unable to vote in person due to age, illness, or disability. They must return the ballot before 8pm on Election Day.
- Personal assistance is allowed at any stage of the electoral process as long as the person assisting you is not a candidate, your employer, or your union rep.
- Alaska allows curbside voting for those who are unable to enter the polling place.
- Alaska provides Voting Tablets at every polling place that can provide a magnified, high contrast, and audio ballot. The Voting Tablet offers an audio ballot in English, Yup'ik, Inupiaq, Cup'ig, and Tagalog.

Voting as a New Citizen

Naturalized citizens have the same right to vote as citizens born in the United States. VoteRiders, a nonpartisan organization focused on voter-ID, recommends that new citizens:

- Update ID documents to be sure your citizen status is reflected accurately.
- Check your voter registration to ensure that you are registered (and then check again before your state's voter registration deadline).
- Familiarize yourself with the laws in your state that have to do with voting. Verify if language assistance is readily available.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Alaska does not require an excuse for absentee voting.
- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 24.
- You can request an absentee ballot here: absenteeballotapplication.alaska.gov
- Your absentee ballot can be hand delivered on election day.
- In Alaska an absentee ballot must be postmarked by Tuesday, November 3.
If you are returning your absentee ballot by mail on election day the Alaska elections division recommends having the USPS postal clerk handle your ballot at the counter.



Alaska requires that you sign your ballot envelope in front of a witness that is 18 years of age or older and provide at least one identifier. The witness is also required to sign your ballot envelope.

Early voting

Vote early.

- All registered voters in Alaska can vote early for any reason.
- You can find information about early voting locations here: vote411.org/pflag
- Early voting begins in Alaska on October 19 and ends on November 2.
- Early voting locations have different hours and district ballots available.
- Voters who plan to vote early in Alaska are required to have identification.

Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Alaska at 7am and close at 8pm on Tuesday, November 3.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:

- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
