First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Colorado
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline, online and by mail, in Colorado is October 26.



**You can register to vote and change your
address on election day in Colorado.**

Voter Identification

In Colorado, photo IDs are required to register and cast a ballot.

- If you're voting by mail for the first time, you may also need to provide a photocopy of your identification when you return your mail ballot.

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Colorado does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions



Voting While Living With a Disability

- Voters with a disability can vote an electronic ballot from the location of your choice. You can access your electronic ballot here: myballot.coloradosos.gov
- Colorado law allows for curbside voting; however, the Secretary of State's website does not provide any guidance on curbside voting and suggests that those who have difficulties walking long distances request a chair or bench to be placed along the route to the polling location from the parking lot.
- If a polling place is in a location where full compliance with the ADA is not possible, the polling place must take steps to remedy the issue (e.g., setting up temporary accessible parking signs, constructing a temporary portable ramp).

Voting as a New Citizen

Naturalized citizens have the same right to vote as citizens born in the United States. VoteRiders, a nonpartisan organization focused on voter-ID, recommends that new citizens:

- Update ID documents to be sure your citizen status is reflected accurately.
- Check your voter registration to ensure that you are registered (and then check again before your state's voter registration deadline).
- Familiarize yourself with the laws in your state that have to do with voting. Verify if language assistance is readily available.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Voters do not need to request an absentee ballot. All voters registered by October 26 will receive a vote-by-mail ballot automatically.
- In Colorado, an absentee ballot must be received by 7pm on November 3 (Election Day).
- Your absentee ballot can be hand delivered on Election Day to a polling place, local election office, or a drop box.



PFLAG recommends that voters get their mail ballots in the mailbox no later than Tuesday, October 20.

Early voting

Vote early.

- All registered voters in Colorado can vote early in person for any reason.
- You can find information about early voting locations in Colorado here:

- Early voting begins in Colorado on October 19 and ends on November 2.
- Voters who plan to vote early in Colorado are required to have identification.

Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Colorado at 7am and close at 7pm on Tuesday, November 3.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:

- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA
