First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Delaware
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Delaware is October 10.



Voter Identification

In Delaware, identification is requested to cast a ballot.

- If you're unable to provide valid proof of identity and your name is on the poll list, you may complete an Affidavit of Voter Identity. You will then be permitted to vote.

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Delaware does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions



Voting While Living With a Disability

- All polling places in Delaware must be accessible to people with disabilities. You may vote by absentee ballot, in-person during Early Voting, or in-person on Election Day.
- You can ask for help with operating the voting machine. You can ask poll workers or any other person you choose to assist you (except for your employer or union rep).
- All Delaware voting machines are ADA compliant. The Universal Voting Console (UVC) is a headset and handheld device that allows you to vote unassisted.
- Delaware does not offer curbside voting.

Voting as a New Citizen

Naturalized citizens have the same right to vote as citizens born in the United States. VoteRiders, a nonpartisan organization focused on voter-ID, recommends that new citizens:

- Update ID documents to be sure your citizen status is reflected accurately.
- Check your voter registration to ensure that you are registered (and then check again before your state's voter registration deadline).
- Familiarize yourself with the laws in your state that have to do with voting. Verify if language assistance is readily available.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Delaware requires an excuse for absentee voting. Valid excuses include:
 - You are in the public service of the US or the State of Delaware and are unable to come to the polls (this included spouses and dependents of public servants)
 - Your business or occupation prevents you from coming to the polls
 - You're sick or physically disabled
 - You are on vacation
 - The tenets/teachings of your religion prevent you from coming to the polls



Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 30 (by mail and online) and by 12 pm ET on November 2 (in-person).
- In Delaware, an absentee ballot must be received by 8pm on November 3.
- Your absentee ballot can be hand delivered on election day to a local election office or a drop box. You cannot turn it in at your polling place during early voting or on election day.

Early voting

Vote early.

- All registered voters in Delaware can vote early for any reason.
- You can find information about early voting locations in Delaware here: vote411.org/pflag
- Early voting in Delaware is open October 22-24 and October 26-27 (7am-7pm) and October 29-November 1 (11am-7pm). There is no early voting on Sunday, October 25.
- Voters who plan to vote early in Delaware are required to have identification. Learn more here: delaware.gov/guides/voting-in-delaware/



Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Delaware at 7am and close at 8pm on Tuesday, November 3.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here: vote411.org/pflag
- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
