First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Florida
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Florida is October 5.



Voter Identification

In Florida, photo IDs with signature are required to register and cast a ballot.

- If your photo ID does not include your signature, or you do not have a photo ID, you can still cast a provisional ballot.

The Florida SAVE Act is being challenged in court.

If it is not struck down by the courts, it will not go into effect until January 2027.

Nothing has changed related to Voter ID in Florida for the general election in 2026.

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Florida does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions



Voting While Living With a Disability

- Voters with a disability can submit a ballot by mail.
- Depending on the county, there are different systems that allow you to complete the ballot with an electronic device. What devices depend on the county. No matter what county though, ballots cannot be returned electronically. You will still have to return it by mail or in person. Contact your county Supervisor of Elections for more information: dos.elections.myflorida.com/supervisors/
- Supervised voting is available to any resident of an assisted living facility or nursing home. The facility's administrator must request the service. Requests can be made to your county's Supervisor of Elections: dos.elections.myflorida.com/supervisors/
- Curbside voting is not available; however, all polling places must be accessible for voting.

Voting as a New Citizen

Naturalized citizens have the same right to vote as citizens born in the United States. VoteRiders, a nonpartisan organization focused on voter-ID, recommends that new citizens:

- Update ID documents to be sure your citizen status is reflected accurately.
- Check your voter registration to ensure that you are registered (and then check again before your state's voter registration deadline).
- Familiarize yourself with the laws in your state that have to do with voting. Verify if language assistance is readily available.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Florida does not require an excuse for absentee voting.
- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 22.
- In Florida, an absentee ballot must be received by 7pm on November 3.

- Your absentee ballot cannot be hand delivered to any polling place on Election Day, but it can be returned at a local election office.



**PFLAG recommends that voters
request their absentee ballots as soon
as possible and get them in the
mailbox no later than Tuesday,
October 20.**

Early voting

Vote early.

- All registered voters in Florida can vote early for any reason.
- Early voting is available from at least October 24 – October 31. Additional dates and hours may be offered in your county. All information on locations, dates, and hours for early voting will be posted by October 3.

- Voters who plan to vote early in Florida are required to have photo identification with signature.



Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Florida at 7am and close at 7pm on Tuesday, November 3.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:
vote411.org/pflag
- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
