



GOTV in Idaho

First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Idaho
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Idaho is October 23 (by mail and online).



**You can register to vote
on election day at your
polling place in Idaho.**

Voter Identification

In Idaho, photo ID and proof of residence are required to register to vote. Photo ID is required to cast a ballot.

- If you do not have photo ID, you can complete a signed affidavit attesting to your identity.

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Idaho does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions



Voting While Living With a Disability

- All voting locations will provide voting equipment that offers audio, adjustable font sizes, adjustable contracts, and adaptations for marking the ballot.
- If you are physically unable to stand in line or enter the polling place you are allowed to request to skip the line, be provided a chair, have your place in line held, or have your ballot brought to you (as long as you are within 40 ft of the polling place).
- You can bring someone with you to assist in the voting process (this can not be your employer or union representative) or request help from an election worker.

Voting as a New Citizen

Naturalized citizens have the same right to vote as citizens born in the United States. VoteRiders, a nonpartisan organization focused on voter-ID, recommends that new citizens:

- Update ID documents to be sure your citizen status is reflected accurately.
- Check your voter registration to ensure that you are registered (and then check again before your state's voter registration deadline).
- Familiarize yourself with the laws in your state that have to do with voting. Verify if language assistance is readily available.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Idaho does not require an excuse for absentee voting.
- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 23.
- In Idaho, an absentee ballot must be received by 8pm on November 3.

- Your absentee ballot cannot be hand delivered to a polling place on election day. You must return it by mail, at a secure ballot drop box, or your county elections office.

Early voting

Vote early.

- Some counties offer early voting. Any registered voter in that county may vote early. Check with your county elections office for early voting availability, dates, and times: voteidaho.gov/county-clerk/
- Early voting may begin as early as October 13 and must end by 5pm on October 30.

Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Idaho at 8am and close at 8pm on Tuesday, November 3.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:

- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA



If you are in line to vote
when the polls close,
STAY IN LINE.
