First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Indiana
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Indiana is October 5.



Voter Identification

In Indiana, photo IDs are required to register and cast a ballot.

- Your photo ID must meet specific criteria to be considered acceptable.
- If you do not present an acceptable ID, you can cast a provisional ballot. You have until noon 10 days after the election to provide the necessary documentation or affirm you have an exemption (e.g., you have a religious objection to being photographed).

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Indiana does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions



Voting While Living With a Disability

- All polling locations will have at least one accessible voting machine and all sites must have a physically accessible facility.
- Curbside voting is not available.
- Voters with disabilities can receive assistance voting. You may bring someone or request help from an election worker. The person assisting you cannot be your employer or a representative from your union.

Voting as a New Citizen

Naturalized citizens have the same right to vote as citizens born in the United States. VoteRiders, a nonpartisan organization focused on voter-ID, recommends that new citizens:

- Update ID documents to be sure your citizen status is reflected accurately.
- Check your voter registration to ensure that you are registered (and then check again before your state's voter registration deadline).
- Familiarize yourself with the laws in your state that have to do with voting. Verify if language assistance is readily available.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Indiana requires an excuse for absentee voting. Valid excuses include:

- You will be absent from the county on Election Day.
- You have a disability, are at least 65, and/or are confined due to illness or injury.
- You're scheduled to work during the entire 12 hours that the polls are open.
- You are prevented from voting because of a religious discipline.
- You are a participant in the state's address confidentiality program.
- You are prevented from voting due to the unavailability of transportation to the polls.



Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- To vote absentee by mail, a voter must complete an application before each election. The application is available online here [in.gov/sos/elections/voter-information/ways-to-vote/absentee-voting/#ABSENTEE VOTING BY MAIL](https://in.gov/sos/elections/voter-information/ways-to-vote/absentee-voting/#ABSENTEE_VOTING_BY_MAIL).
- Absentee voters must include an ID number or a photocopy of their government issued ID with their application.
- Voters must request their absentee-by-mail ballot by October 22. The application must be received by 11:59pm.
- In Indiana, an absentee ballot must be received by 6 pm on Tuesday, November 3.



**PFLAG recommends that voters

as possible and get them in the
mailbox no later than Tuesday,
October 20.**

Early voting (In-Person Absentee)

Vote early.

- All registered voters in Indiana can vote early (in-person absentee) for any reason.
- You can find information about early voting locations in Indiana here: vote411.org/pflag
- In-person absentee voting begins in Indiana on October 6 and ends on November 2 at 12pm. All Indiana counties must make in-person absentee voting available on Saturday October 24 and Saturday, October 31.
- Voters who plan to vote in-person absentee in Indiana are required to have identification. Learn more here: in.gov/sos/elections/voter-information/photo-id-law/



Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Indiana at 6am and close at 6pm on Tuesday, November 3.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:
vote411.org/pflag
- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
