First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Kansas
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Kansas is October 13.



Voter Identification

In Kansas, photo IDs are required to cast a ballot.

- Voters who do not have an approved government-issued ID can apply for a free nondriver identification card with the Kansas DMV.
- Permanent advance voters, military and overseas voters, and voters with religious objections are exempt from the photo ID requirement.

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Kansas does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions



Voting While Living With a Disability

- Each polling place will have at least one voting machine that allows voters with disabilities to vote independently. You are still welcome to request assistance from an election worker or a companion.
- Kansas state law requires that there be ramps and handrails, wheelchair accessible voting booths, and wheelchair friendly doorways at polling places. This is in addition to the accessibility requirements outlined in the ADA and HAVA.
- Curbside voting is available for elderly voters and voters with disabilities in Kansas.

Voting as a New Citizen

Naturalized citizens have the same right to vote as citizens born in the United States. VoteRiders, a nonpartisan organization focused on voter-ID, recommends that new citizens:

- Update ID documents to be sure your citizen status is reflected accurately.
- Check your voter registration to ensure that you are registered (and then check again before your state's voter registration deadline).
- Familiarize yourself with the laws in your state that have to do with voting. Verify if language assistance is readily available.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Kansas does not require an excuse for absentee voting.
- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 27.
- Senate Bill 4, in Kansas states that absentee ballots must be received by 7 pm on Tuesday, November 3 (when the polls close)*.

- Your absentee ballot can be hand delivered on election day to any polling place within your county.

***The Kansas Supreme Court recently upheld a 3-day grace period for mailed ballots in the August primary election.**

It is unclear what, if any, impact this will have on the general election at this time.

as possible and get them in the
mailbox no later than Tuesday,
October 20.**

Early voting

Vote early.

- All registered voters in Kansas can vote early for any reason.
- Dates of early voting and locations vary by county. You can find information about early voting locations in Kansas here: vote411.org/pflag
- All early voting locations must be open by October 27 and all locations close on November 2 at 12pm.
- Some counties may begin early voting as early as October 14.
- Voters who plan to vote early in Kansas are required to have identification.



Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Kansas at 7am and close at 7pm on Tuesday, November 3.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:
vote411.org/pflag
- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
