First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Nevada
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Nevada is October 6 (by mail) and November 3 (in person and online).



You can register to vote at your polling place on election day in Nevada.

You must have a valid Nevada Driver's License or Nevada ID Card to take advantage of same-day registration and proof of residence if your ID does not have your current residential address.

Voter Identification

In Nevada, ID is required to register but not to cast a ballot, except for some first-time voters.

- You may have to provide identification if you're a first-time voter who provided data on your voter registration application that does not match data on file with the DMV or Social Security Administration, and you did not respond to the letter that notified you of the discrepancy.

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Nevada does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions



Voting While Living With a Disability

- You may use the EASE online system to register to vote and complete an electronic ballot. Learn more here: nvease.gov/
- All polling locations in Nevada have been certified compliant under the ADA.
- All county election officials are required to make reasonable accommodations. Contact your county clerk/registrar if you have any concerns: nvsos.gov/sos/elections/voters/county-clerk-contact-information
- Every polling place will have a voting booth that includes ample room for wheelchair access, audio, and sip and puff compatibility. All voting machines also have large print and zoom capabilities.

Voting as a New Citizen

Naturalized citizens have the same right to vote as citizens born in the United States. VoteRiders, a nonpartisan organization focused on voter-ID, recommends that new citizens:

- Update ID documents to be sure your citizen status is reflected accurately.
- Check your voter registration to ensure that you are registered (and then check again before your state's voter registration deadline).
- Familiarize yourself with the laws in your state that have to do with voting. Verify if language assistance is readily available.

be mailed a ballot.**

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- If you register before or on October 20 you do not need to request a vote-by-mail ballot.
- Voters can request to opt-out of receiving a ballot by mail by submitting a form to their county clerk.
- In Nevada, an absentee ballot must be postmarked by Tuesday, November 3 and received by 5 pm on the 4th day after the election if it is being returned by mail.
- If you would like to hand deliver your ballot to an official drop-box, vote center, polling location, or the clerk/registrar's office it must be dropped off by 7pm on November 3.



PFLAG recommends that voters get their ballots in the mailbox no later than Tuesday, October 20.

Early voting

Vote early.

- All registered voters in Nevada can vote early for any reason.
- You can find information about early voting locations in Nevada here: vote411.org/pflag
- You can vote at any location in your county where early voting is offered.
- Early voting begins in Nevada on October 17 and ends on October 30.



Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Nevada at 7am and close at 7pm on Tuesday, November 3.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:

- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
