



GOTV in New Hampshire

First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in New Hampshire
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in New Hampshire depends on the locality; however, same day registration is available on November 3.



**You can register to vote in-person,
at your polling place on election day.
To do so, you will need proof of
your identity, age, U.S. citizenship and
domicile (primary residence address).**

Voter Identification

In New Hampshire, photo IDs are required to register and cast a ballot.

- If you do not have an approved photo ID, you can obtain a free photo ID by presenting a voucher from your town clerk, or the Secretary of State, to any NH DMV.

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of New Hampshire does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions



Voting While Living With a Disability

- Every polling place in New Hampshire is required to be accessible to people with disabilities and have at least one accessible voting system that allows voters with a disability to vote independently and privately.
- Curbside voting is available for voters who are unable to enter the polling place using the absentee voter procedure. You can only vote in this manner if an unforeseen accessibility issue arises.
- You can receive assistance from an election worker or a support person of your choice. The person cannot be your employer or a representative of your union.

Voting as a New Citizen

Naturalized citizens have the same right to vote as citizens born in the United States. VoteRiders, a nonpartisan organization focused on voter-ID, recommends that new citizens:

- Update ID documents to be sure your citizen status is reflected accurately.
- Check your voter registration to ensure that you are registered (and then check again before your state's voter registration deadline).
- Familiarize yourself with the laws in your state that have to do with voting. Verify if language assistance is readily available.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- New Hampshire requires an excuse for absentee voting. Valid excuses include:
 - An absence from town on election day
 - A religious observance that prevents you from voting in person
 - A physical disability or illness that prevents you from voting in person
 - An employment or childcare commitment during the entire time the polls are open
 - And more: sos.nh.gov/elections/absentee-ballots



Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- The deadline to request an absentee ballot by mail is 12pm on Monday, November 2. The deadline to request and absentee ballot in-person is 5pm Monday, November 2.
- Absentee ballots can be returned by mail or returned by hand, by the voter or a “delivery agent,” to the clerk’s office.
- In New Hampshire, an absentee ballot must be received by 5pm on Tuesday, November 3 (delivered by mail) and by 5 pm Monday, November 2 (delivered in-person).
- Absentee ballots cannot be delivered to your polling place on election day.



**PFLAG recommends that voters
request their absentee ballots as soon
as possible and get them in the
mailbox no later than Tuesday,
October 20.**

**New Hampshire does not
offer in-person early voting.**

Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in New Hampshire between 6am and 11am and close no earlier than 7pm on Tuesday, November 3.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:

- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
