

GOTV in Oklahoma

First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Oklahoma
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Oklahoma is October 9.



Voter Identification

In Oklahoma, proof of identity is required to cast a ballot.

- Oklahoma Voter ID Cards are valid proof of identity even though they do not include a photograph.
- If you do not have or refuse to show proof of identity, you may vote a provisional ballot and sign a sworn affidavit.

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Oklahoma does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions

Voting While Living With a Disability

- Except in extreme circumstances, all polling places in Oklahoma are physically accessible.
- Every polling place is equipped with a Hart InterCivic eScan A/T voting device which has an audio tactile interface. It is compatible with sip and puff devices and tactile input switches.
- Voters who are blind may apply for an accessible absentee ballot be delivered electronically; however, the ballot must be returned by mail or in person to the county election board.
- Voters with disabilities do not have to have their absentee ballot notarized, but they must have two witnesses sign their ballot.
- Curbside voting is available for voters who are physically unable to enter their polling place.

Voting as a New Citizen

Naturalized citizens have the same right to vote as citizens born in the United States. VoteRiders, a nonpartisan organization focused on voter-ID, recommends that new citizens:

- Update ID documents to be sure your citizen status is reflected accurately.
- Check your voter registration to ensure that you are registered (and then check again before your state's voter registration deadline).
- Familiarize yourself with the laws in your state that have to do with voting. Verify if language assistance is readily available.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Oklahoma does not require an excuse for absentee voting.
- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 19.
- In Oklahoma, an absentee ballot must be received by close of business on Monday, November 2 if dropping off in person. The ballot must be received by 7 pm on November 3 if returning by mail.
- There are several different types of absentee ballots in Oklahoma. Each type has its own specific instructions for requesting, completing, and returning the ballot. Learn more here: oklahoma.gov/elections/voters/absentee-voting.html.

Early Voting

Vote early.

- All registered voters in Oklahoma can vote early for any reason.
- You can find information about early voting locations in Oklahoma here: vote411.org/pflag
- Early voting is available in Oklahoma from 8am-6 pm on October 28, 29, 30 and from 8am-2pm on Saturday, October 31
- Voters who plan to vote early in Oklahoma are required to have identification. Learn more here: oklahoma.gov/elections/voters/proof-of-identity.html



Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Oklahoma at 7am and close at 7pm on Tuesday, November 3.

- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
