First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Oregon
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Oregon is October 13.



Voter Identification

In Oregon, identification is required to register, but not to cast a ballot.

- If you don't have an Oregon ID, you may still register online, but you'll need to print a voter registration card, sign it, and deliver it to your county elections office (by mail or in person).

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Oregon does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions



Voting While Living With a Disability

- Voters with disabilities can use a screen reader or other assistive technology to access their ballot at home. You will need to print, sign, and return via mail to your county elections office.
- Any Oregon voter can request and receive help from a poll worker or chosen helper, as long as the helper is not their employer or their union representative.
- All county election's offices will have an accessible voting machine on election day.
- Curbside voting is not available on election day.

Voting as a New Citizen

Naturalized citizens have the same right to vote as citizens born in the United States. VoteRiders, a nonpartisan organization focused on voter-ID, recommends that new citizens:

- Update ID documents to be sure your citizen status is reflected accurately.
- Check your voter registration to ensure that you are registered (and then check again before your state's voter registration deadline).
- Familiarize yourself with the laws in your state that have to do with voting. Verify if language assistance is readily available.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Oregon is an all vote-by-mail state and has been for more than 20 years.
- All registered Oregon voters will receive their voters' pamphlets and ballots in the mail two to three weeks before the election.
- If you do not receive your ballot by Tuesday, October 20, need to replace your ballot, receive multiple ballots, or have any other questions or concerns – contact your county elections office.
- If you will be away from your residence during that time, you can have your ballot sent to a different mailing address.



Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- In Oregon, a mail ballot must be received or postmarked by 8pm on Election Day.
- Your absentee ballot cannot be hand delivered to your county elections office on election day. It must be mailed or dropped off at any official drop box.

Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Voters who wish to vote in person can do so at their county elections office which are open 7am-8pm on election day. Contact your county elections office and the county clerk to learn more.

- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
