

GOTV in Rhode Island

First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Rhode Island
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Rhode Island is October 4



Voter Identification

In Rhode Island, photo IDs are required to cast a ballot.

- If you do not possess an acceptable photo ID, you can receive a free voter photo ID card.
- If you don't provide a photo ID, you can cast a provisional ballot and provide a photo ID to the Board of Canvassers by close of business on November 4.

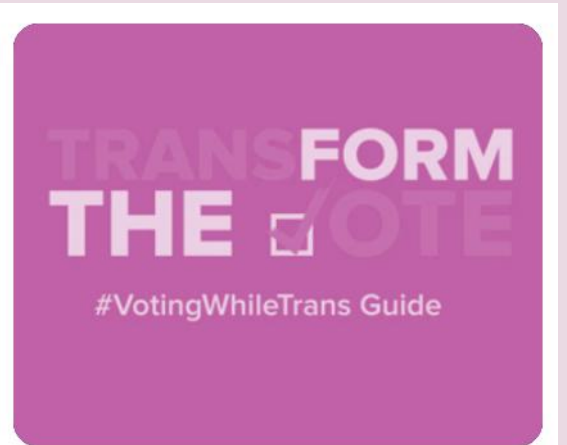

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

Here are additional recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions

Voting While Living With a Disability

- Each polling place will have an accessible voting machine, the ExpressVote system.
- ExpressVote features include: touch screen, tactile controller, buttons with Braille text, audio, ADA dual switch access port, and high contrast mode.
- All voters over 65 must be allowed to use the seated voting booth.
- Curbside voting is not available. Voters with a medical disability that doesn't allow them to wait in line, can be moved to the front of the line.
- Voters can request that an election official or a person of their choice assist them after completing an affidavit.

Voting as a New Citizen

Naturalized citizens have the same right to vote as citizens born in the United States. VoteRiders, a nonpartisan organization focused on voter-ID, recommends that new citizens:

- Update ID documents to be sure your citizen status is reflected accurately.
- Check your voter registration to ensure that you are registered (and then check again before your state's voter registration deadline).
- Familiarize yourself with the laws in your state that have to do with voting. Verify if language assistance is readily available.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Rhode Island does not require an excuse for absentee voting.
- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 13.
- In Rhode Island, an absentee ballot must be received by 8pm on November 3.
- You can request an absentee ballot here: mailballot.sos.ri.gov/.
- Your absentee ballot cannot be hand delivered to your polling place on election day. You must return it via mail, drop box, or hand delivery at the Board of Elections at 2000 Plainfield Pike, Suite A Cranston, RI 02921.



**PFLAG recommends that voters
request their absentee ballots as soon
as possible and get them in the
mailbox no later than Tuesday,
October 20.**

Early Voting

- All registered voters in Rhode Island can vote early for any reason.

- Early voting begins in Rhode Island on October 14 and ends at 4pm on November 2.
- Voters who plan to vote early in Rhode Island are required to have identification.

Getting Out The Vote

Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Rhode Island at 7am (with the exception of New Shoreham where polls open at 9am) and close at 8pm on Tuesday, November 3.

- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
