



GOTV in Vermont

First things first

Register to vote.

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Vermont
- When you register online you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline online and by mail in Vermont is November 3.



You can register to vote in-person at your city clerk's office on Election Day in Vermont.

Voter Identification

In Vermont, ID is required to register to vote but not to cast a ballot.

- If you're a first-time voter who registered by mail, you will have to show ID in order to vote.
- First-time registrants in Vermont must take the Voter's Oath, which may be self-administered.

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Vermont does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions



Voting While Living With a Disability

- Every polling place will have accessible parking, curbside voting, and accessible voting equipment.
- The "OmniBallot Tablet" is Vermont's accessible voting system. The tablet has a screen reader, headphones, 8 key navigation pad, toggle switches, and a touch screen.
- You can vote from home using the "OmniBallot Online" system. You must print the ballot and return it via mail, or hand deliver it to your polling place on election day or your Clerk's office before election day.
- Vermont will automatically mail ballots to all registered voters as well.

Voting as a New Citizen

Naturalized citizens have the same right to vote as citizens born in the United States. VoteRiders, a nonpartisan organization focused on voter-ID, recommends that new citizens:

- Update ID documents to be sure your citizen status is reflected accurately.
- Check your voter registration to ensure that you are registered (and then check again before your state's voter registration deadline).
- Familiarize yourself with the laws in your state that have to do with voting. Verify if language assistance is readily available.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Vermont automatically mails ballots to all registered voters.
- In Vermont, an absentee ballot must be received by 7pm on November 3.
- Your absentee ballot can be returned by mail or it can be hand delivered on election day to your town clerk's office or polling place.
- Voters may request an absentee ballot if they need their ballot mailed to a mailing address that's different from their residential address. Requests must be submitted by 5pm on November 2.

Voting Early

Vote early.

- All registered voters in Vermont can vote early (also known as in-person absentee voting) for any reason.
- Voters are encouraged to contact their local election office to learn more about early voting in their area.
- Generally, voters in Vermont can vote early at your town clerk's office during normal business hours.
- Early voting begins in Vermont on September 19 and ends on November 2.



Getting Out The Vote

Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Vermont between 5am and 10am and close at 7pm on Tuesday, November 3.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:

- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
