

GOTV in Wisconsin

First things first

Register to vote.

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Wisconsin
- When you register online you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Wisconsin is October 14 (online and by mail) and October 30 (in-person at the Municipal Clerk's office).



**You can register to vote in-person at your
polling place on Election Day in Wisconsin.**

Voter Identification

In Wisconsin, photo IDs are required to cast a ballot.

- If you do not have a photo ID, you can get a free state ID card. More information: elections.wi.gov/acceptable-photo-ids
- The ID you provide does not need to be an exact match to the poll book

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Wisconsin does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions



Voting While Living With a Disability

- All polling places must be accessible based on HAVA and ADA accessibility standards. Learn more: elections.wi.gov/voters/accessible-voting
- All polling places must have at least one accessible voting machine.
- You have the right to ask for a "reasonable accommodation." Accommodations generally considered reasonable include a chair to sit, a signature guide, a magnifying glass, or assistance using the voting machine.
- Curbside voting is available if you cannot enter the polling place.

Voting as a New Citizen

Naturalized citizens have the same right to vote as citizens born in the United States. VoteRiders, a nonpartisan organization focused on voter-ID, recommends that new citizens:

- Update ID documents to be sure your citizen status is reflected accurately.
- Check your voter registration to ensure that you are registered (and then check again before your state's voter registration deadline).
- Familiarize yourself with the laws in your state that have to do with voting. Verify if language assistance is readily available.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Wisconsin does not require an excuse for absentee voting.
- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 29.
- In Wisconsin, an absentee ballot must be received by 8pm on November 3.
- You can request an absentee ballot here: myvote.wi.gov/en-us/Vote-Absentee-By-Mail.
- Your absentee ballot can be hand delivered on election day at your assigned polling place.

Early Voting (Absentee In-Person)

Vote early.

- All registered voters in Wisconsin can vote early for any reason.
- Early voting dates and locations vary by county. Officially designated absentee in-person voting sites should open by October 20. Find more information here: vote411.org/pflag
- Voters who plan to vote early in Wisconsin are required to have identification. Learn more here: bringit.wi.gov/do-i-have-right-photo-id



Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Wisconsin at 7am and close at 8pm on Tuesday, November 3.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here:
vote411.org/pflag
- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
